



- What do you notice about June's cadence, tone and layering in the song?
- How is this method of singing similar or different to modern forms of music?
- How does this song capture the essence of Lyla's Indigenous roots?
- How is the background and context of the music video significant to the lyrics?



• What images and references do her lyrics contain? Why is this significant?

- How are Miracle and Youssef representing their Indigenous roots visually? What traditions, dress and practices do they represent?
- How does Miracle use rap as a vehicle for carrying on his Indigenous roots?
- What types of images are represented in the video? For example, what is the significance of showing Indigenous communities in contrast to the police force?



 What parallels are there in this music video and other forms of protest America has seen in recent years?
